METHODOLOGY

This report is compiled from publicly available sources, court records, and investigative journalism. Every factual assertion traces to a source in the source list (Appendix). Claims that cannot be sourced are removed or clearly marked as speculation. Pattern identification uses the Deceit Lexicon framework (deceit.site/lexicon).

Source Verification

All sources cited in this report were verified as live and accessible at the time of compilation. Source URLs are listed in the Appendix. If a source URL has broken since compilation, the original document can typically be found via the Wayback Machine (web.archive.org).

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Executive Summary

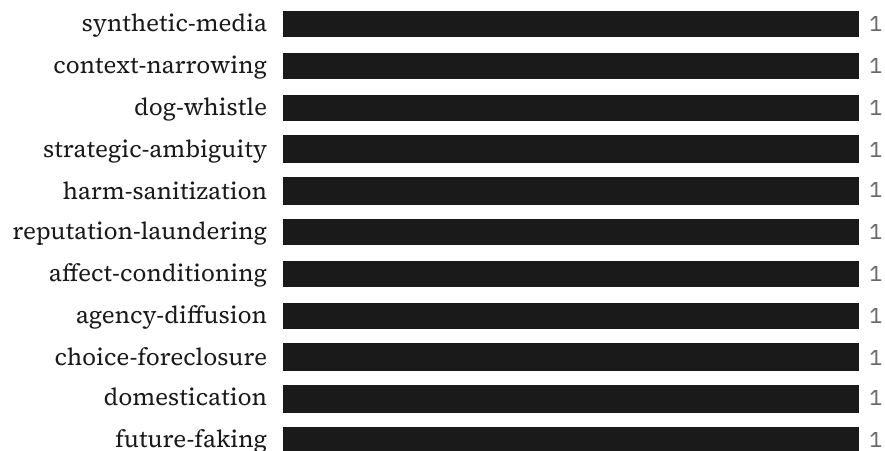
A reconstructed institutional analysis of religious fraud.

KEY FINDINGS

1. Religious fraud is not a series of individual bad actors but a deployable pattern system with identifiable architecture.
2. The same patterns appear across denominations and traditions: love bombing, future faking, isolation through concern, and duty weaponization.
3. Financial fraud in religious contexts typically follows a predictable escalation: voluntary giving becomes expected giving becomes compelled giving.
4. Faith healing fraud causes measurable harm: delayed medical treatment, financial devastation, and psychological manipulation of vulnerable populations.
5. The machinery is visible once you know the names. Pattern literacy is the most effective defense against religious manipulation.

Pattern Frequency Analysis

The following chart shows which manipulation patterns appear most frequently across the 11 unique patterns identified in the religion editorial series. This analysis is generated programmatically from the patterns frontmatter field of each piece.



The frequency distribution reveals which patterns are most central to the religion disinformation ecosystem. The most frequent patterns are not necessarily the most harmful, but they are the most structurally important — they appear across multiple incidents and serve as connective tissue between separate events.

Case Studies

The following pieces from the deceit.media editorial series are included as case studies. Each piece has been reframed with an introduction connecting it to the pattern analysis above.

A viral video claimed Saint Carlo Acutis predicted three days of darkness. He did not.

Saint Carlo Acutis, the millennial saint, canonized in 2025, known for putting Catholic teachings online, has now predicted three days of darkness in 2026 that most people will not survive. He delivered this prediction through his mother, Antonia Salzano, in a YouTube video with about 27,500 views on a religious channel with about 9,200 subscribers. The video is titled "Carlo Acutis revealed the 3 days of darkness in 2026... most people won't survive," which is the kind of title that tells you everything about the video except what is in it.

The only problem is that the video is a manipulation. Salzano's mouth movements do not match the audio. Her hand gestures repeat on a loop. A scan by DeCopy.ai found a 100% likelihood that the video was a mix of human and AI work. The original video was a prayer series in which Salzano narrated memories of her son. No part of it contained a prediction about three days of darkness, because Carlo Acutis never made one. There are no credible reports,

When a defense secretary's pastor says he wants a politician 'crucified'

In March 2026, Brooks Potteiger, the pastor of US Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth, appeared on the podcast "Reformation Red Pill" and said of Texas state Representative James Talarico, a Democrat: "We want him crucified." The podcast's host, Joshua Haymes, also a member of Potteiger's church, added: "I pray that God kills him. Ultimately, that means killing his heart and raising him up to new life in Christ."

Snopes investigated and found that the broader context suggested Potteiger and Haymes were speaking figuratively about spiritual transformation, not literally calling for physical violence. Snopes rated the literal-violence reading as false; Potteiger and Haymes say they were speaking about spiritual transformation. But the language matters, and the context in which it was delivered matters more.

The rhetoric of religious violence

The word "crucified" in a Christian context carries a specific weight. It is the central image of the faith, a man executed by the state

Six domains. One pattern. The cost is real, the framing is manufactured, and the distance between them is not an accident.

I spent three weeks reading sustainability reports, FDA adverse event filings, cognitive neuroscience papers, election security briefings, and Barna Group survey data. I did not expect to find deception. I expected to find the structure of deception, and I wanted to see whether it held across unrelated fields.

It holds.

The pattern is this: a technology optimized for growth produces costs that are structurally inseparable from the growth. The companies producing the costs also produce the narrative that obscures them. The media that should interrogate the narrative is financially dependent on the companies producing it. The public receives a story about solutions while the evidence describes acceleration.

This is architecture. Nobody is confused. Nobody is accidentally producing these outcomes. The in
